
Erasmus School of Economics

1. Erasmus-building/A-hall (Nobel prize) Jan Tinbergen, Erasmus statue, Aula)

- Built during 1963 and 1969 and (together with the Theil-building) the oldest building on campus. The construction was commissioned by the Netherlands School of Economics, the predecessor of Erasmus University, because their location in Delfshaven (West part of Rotterdam) had become too small to accommodate all students.
- o Auditorium is the largest lecture hall of the campus

2. Theil-building/C-hall (lecture room, tutorial room, coffee corner)

o Henri Theil (1924 – 2000) was Professor at the Netherlands School of Economics. Theil is the initiator for the discipline econometrics.

3. Tinbergen-building/H-cafeteria (Etude)

- o Originally the Erasmus School of Economics building, but currently out of order
- o In 1969 Jan Tinbergen together with Ragnar Frisch receive, the first Nobel Prize for Economics. Tinbergen was a professor at Erasmus School of Economics and is internationally known as the founder of Econometrics. The Nobel Prize, a coin, is displayed near the Aula.

6. E-building (ERASMUS SCHOOL OF ECONOMICS + Information Desk)

- Erasmus School of Economics is located here (Dean's office, support office, study advisers, professors) – Note that this is where they would go if they need support from the university

7. Sports building

o New sports building that recently opened. Brand new equipment in the gym and new facilities with a lot of space

8. Sanders-building (ESSC / IT helpdesk)

- o The Erasmus Student Service Centre (ESSC) is the central service point for all future and current students of Erasmus University Rotterdam.
- o Students can receive information about many issues, applications for various statements, registration for examinations and language courses; make an appointment with a student counselor and psychologist, tuition fees, etc.
- Erasmus School of Law is located in the left side of the building
- o Piet Sanders (1912 2012) was professor at the Netherlands School of Economics. He was in charge of developing a new faculty for law.

9. Tinbergen plaza

o Pass by Tinbergen Plaza. The square is named after Jan Tinbergen, an Erasmus School of Economics alumnus who was the first person to win a Nobel Prize in economics.

10. Mandeville-building

- o The Institute of Psychology
- o Rotterdam School of Management (RSM)

11. Van der Goot-building (Exam rooms)

o Alumna Willemien van der Goot (1897 – 1989) was the first PhD student of the NHH, she was also the first woman in the Netherlands who graduated to an economic topic.

12. V-building

o Temporary building with smaller lecture rooms

13. Erasmus Plaza /food court/ hairdresser / bike shop

o We don't call our campus a mini-city without reason. Next to a hairdresser and bike repair shop we have multiple options for a nice coffee, to have a beer (café In de Smitse/Erasmus Paviljoen) or get a proper 'student meal' on campus. In the food court you can find 6 different (world) kitchens under one roof, and there is a mini-supermarket around the corner.

14. Polak-building (study facilities / Erasmus Studio)

- o Popular building on campus with 900 study places. Highly energy efficient building (sustainable techniques such as thermal storage in the soil, optimal use of daylight, and smart lighting).
- o In addition to study spaces, a common place to attend tutorials and hold meetings in rooms

15. Langeveld-building

- o This is a very new building that has gained a lot of popularity among the students due to the spaces available. The Living room is also in this building. There you can relax, play games and take some time from your studies.
- o Similar to the Polak-building, you can find a lot of study spaces in this building (3,000 study spots)
- This building is recognized for its innovative structure and sustainable design. Its interior has a lot of greens and was recognized as the most sustainable educational building in The Netherlands

16. Hatta-building

- o In this building student dorms are situated
- o "In De Smitse" opened its new student-bar below the building
- o Hatta is known as one of the founding fathers of the Republic of Indonesia.
- o This building is home to mostly international students. On the 14th and 15th floor are 34 independent units. The other 340 rooms are let fully furnished, the kitchen, shower and toilet shared by 2 or 3 people. On the other side of campus is the new Xior building. This building has 280 studio apartments with all private bathroom and kitchen facilities.

17. Erasmus Pavilion (café/theatre)

o Vibrant meeting point in the heart of the campus. In the pavilion is a theatre, grand cafe, foyer and reserved study places for students who are in the honours programme.
